By way of summary, advanced trainings that have been conducted, which is a thing that had not been happening much around here for several years, I'm very proud to report since we met last, the NMLEA hosted, sponsored, paid for, and advertised a significant training class that occurred here on August 4th and 5th. The topic was fair and impartial policing. We hired nationwide-recognized experts. We selected 30 students as trainers from constituencies throughout the state so that they could receive the training and then return to their communities to disseminate what they had learned here in a training and trainer environment. The next scheduled class is October 11th through 13th, and that deals with internal affairs investigations and ethics training. Also, the same criteria will apply, we'll be inviting folks from throughout the state, many have already signed up. They will return and be able to share what they've learned here at the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy. And rounding out this process, in November on the 17th and 18th, we will be hosting a much larger, in this case, 80-person class, focusing on deescalation techniques in law enforcement, taught by
