MR. DWORAK: Thank you, chairman, members of the board. As most of you recall, every year this public body, just like every public body in the state of New Mexico, is required under the New Mexico Open Meetings Act to determine what constitutes reasonable notice to it for meetings subject to the public -- subject to the Open Meetings Act.

The resolution that's been provided to the members of the board is not in any way different substantively from the resolution from last year, with the exception of references to accommodations related to the public health emergencies and related executive orders issued by the governor. Since there are no longer any executive orders in effect, that reference has been removed. Appropriately,

CHAIRPERSON TORREZ: Do any members of the board have questions for counsel regarding the specific provisions outlined in the resolution?

Seeing none, at this time I will entertain a motion to adopt the 2023 Open Meetings Act resolution.

DR. GREEN: Thank you, sir. To the members of the board, I look forward to serving as usual. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON TORREZ: We will now move on to item seven on our agenda, the director's report. We'll hear a report from Director Ben Baker --Interim Director Ben Baker, and we'll have opportunity to ask any questions following his report to the board. Thank you.

Director Baker.

MR. BAKER: Thank you, Chair Torrez, members of the board, members of the public, professional colleagues and friends. Can everybody hear me okay? Yes. Very well. I'll try not to shout into the microphone.

First, welcome our new attorney general and Chair AG Torrez. Thank you for joining us, sir. It's a pleasure to serve this board and to have you here today.

On behalf of the secretary, myself, and the members of our staff here at the New Mexico Law

Enforcement Academy Board, welcome to both DPS and the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy Board.

This has been a busy start to the day. In addition to the traffic problems by those coming northbound, we have a packed house. I'm glad everybody not only on this body but the public can see we're very busy here. I'm going to tell you about what's going on here.

Just a reminder about the constituency we serve, licensed professionals in public safety, telecommunications, and law enforcement. Approximately 8,000 license holders encompassing over 193 agencies statewide.

Some of you had the opportunity to meet our class next door which represents 20 of those agencies. We're very proud of identifying that constituency.

By way of brief summary, with the notion of time, I offer some updates from the last time we met. The attorney general alluded to the legislative matters. I will touch briefly upon Senate Bill 19, which is the legislative item which will inform what happens here at the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy Board going forward. Yesterday that bill was signed into law by the governor. That

developed and maintained by law enforcement agencies. Policy minimums are defined within the statute as described with specificity, lateral vascular neck restraints, and shooting firearms at moving vehicles.

The bill describes penalties for unlawful use of force and failing to intervene on a report, that unilateral use of force. It also contemplates what's to be done in the interim, a temporary provision indicating the rules of the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy Board shall continue in effect until amended or appealed by the New Mexico Law Enforcement standards of training council or -- let the record reflect that Officer Williams arrived in the room -- or the law enforcement certification board as applicable.

On another legislative update that's particularly material to the Law Enforcement Academy Board, the legislature has contemplated an appropriation which will literally double the size of the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy staff. There are 21 FTEs today and we've been authorized likely 19 new FTEs to supplement and create and carry out the mission of this work here at the academy.

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bill does and that law does a variety of different things, and I will encapsulate a few of them for your consumption.

It needs to be done in context over the top of an already created law, which was last year's House Bill 68. So it is not a standalone item. It has multiple items slated on top of one another.

The bill contemplates penalties or failure to complete or report inservice or annual training, contemplates the suspension of licensure, of persons who are licensed, and it also contemplates new information, the withholding of monies from the agencies who are not in compliance. I think that's a significant change from what this board and other boards have contemplated or heard before.

The bill defines a database to be established, which is public facing, enabling the public to search for and view the outcomes of misconduct cases which result in suspension or revocation of a public safety telecommunicator or law enforcement certification by name, by the date the action was taken by the board.

The bill outlines and addresses the duty to intervene in unlawful uses of force. The bill calls for a statewide use-of-force policy to be So the creation of these jobs, through our slow process, will be recruiting and retention of qualified and the best public safety professionals will continue to remain paramount, maybe more so than ever.

Many folks in the board have served in this capacity in and around this place. Having a staff of, in this case, 40 people is unprecedented, and I think that's significant.

Moving on to license holders and graduation updates. Today the board will be submitted for approval 23 New Mexico officer certifications and 33 New Mexico public safety telecommunicator certifications. As I mentioned earlier, the basic police officer training class 205. Basic police officer academy class 205 is in session directly adjacent to us. There are 55 cadets in attendance in that class, which is a near record historically. They graduate May 25th.

Also directly adjacent to us across the hall is certification by waiver of training class 111, which is in session. They graduate next Friday. New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy public safety telecommunicator class 159 begins on May 7th, 2023, and is expected to be near capacity.

During the delay of getting the meeting started because of the traffic, I had the opportunity to tour several of the members to a training equipment donation that the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy is the gracious recipient of. Sandia National Laboratories donated a state-of-the-art training simulator to supplement and add value to our training here at the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy. It is a real-life reality-based state-of-the-art training facility, and I'll let the board members comment on it if they wish.

It contemplates many things that have evolved over time, and one of the things that I think is absolutely timely and significant about the scenarios that exist within that training capacity are de-escalation, peer intervention, dealing with persons experiencing mental health crises in a variety of topics, down to specifics of diagnoses. And it allows for the trainer, in this case the certified trainer, to escalate/de-escalate based on the performance of the student. It allows pausing for critiques, feedback, and it allows for replaying so we can see how we performed.

So it is not a video game, and it is a

during their intersection with the equipment.

The reason why this is important, as I just mentioned earlier, is that the legislative body, now the law, has contemplated compliance and tied it to financial incentives through the Law Enforcement Protection Fund. Being able to roster one's agency and affirmatively and in realtime report one's compliance is now a reality, and it's important, and we have seen many agencies using that to their advantage when they're making their application for those funds.

Moving forward to other matters. Off to my right and your left, if you are on the board, the 2023 fallen officers memorial, which I will not spend a tremendous amount of time on here except to say that this is something that we're very proud to be the facilitators of and the caretakers of our memorial outside.

It is an agenda item today for the induction of the names off to my right and your left. Respectful inclusion is an important part of your tasking, and it is a solemn occasion to have to make this many entries, but it is an important part of our work, and we're grateful to be able to have this process in our hands.

shoot/don't shoot only scenario. It has a huge breadth of things that New Mexico police officers experience. We're very proud of that donation and proud to have that. We literally got that last month and just got it operational. It's significant, and we're proud to have it as part of the training structure here.

Records, training, and data management. One of the key metrics that I report to this board that I'm pleased to report here is the relative willingness of clients of agencies to train and engage their staff members with the Acadis data management system, which is the system we use here at the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy. That number has been raised to 560 trained, authenticated operators throughout our division, managing the data entry, the compliance entry, firearm scores, and annual training requirements to us.

We have onboarded since we last met staff to help accomplish some of these tasks, and so we've been responsive during the onboarding of that staff in a number of ways. 655 setups in total, six in-person trainings, 67 virtual trainings at this point, and 44 phone calls asking for help trying to correct troubles that were happening during --

Related to disciplinary matters, closed-session agenda consists of 16 discipline cases. Since we last met, the Law Enforcement Academy Board has received 19 allegations of misconduct that are in the review stage, 14 of which are in the notice of investigation stage. 23 cases are currently in settlement discussions or resolution stages.

Looking rearward at our historical cases, we have 11 cases in the NCA or notice of contemplated action or administrative prosecution stage, the administrative prosecutor. We have five cases that are posthearing, pending a hearing officer's report, and since we have last met, we have issued an immediate notice of temporary suspension on three New Mexico license holders who have been charged with felony offenses.

We have five cases where an appeal has been filed with the courts related to discipline and/or denial rendered by this board against a licensee's license or application, and we have 16 cases, as I mentioned earlier today, pending adjudication, which you have on your agenda.

In total to date the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy Board has 93 total active

disciplinary cases.

Wrapping up, for sake of time, I have gotten to -- the pleasure and the honor to spend now a year in this interim role in addition to my duties across the street at the department of public safety, and I've been able to work closely with the staff of professionals, some of which are seated here today and are responsible for the infrastructure, the day-to-day operations, and the setting up of things, not only this meeting, but all of the things that we have seen going on around us here today.

I'm proud to be a member of this team, and I'm proud to stand before you today to report on our progress relating to staffing of our agency, which has had significant success, reclassifying our positions that were underappreciated, our legislative work, getting recognition and contemplation for the inclusion of public safety telecommunicators and the awards that will come after this board wraps. The first time in state's history. Considering that they're 40 percent of the constituents, that is significant.

And I'm mostly proud of the opportunities I get to spend, and a few of you had the opportunity

Before I turn it over to fellow members of the board for any questions, I wanted to see if you might elaborate a little bit on an issue that was publicly discussed for several years with respect to this board in particular and its ability to move through these cases in a timely fashion. That had to do with the resources you had on staff and vacancies in particular.

Can you talk a little bit about what your current vacancy situation is? And you know, you talked about, I think it's 19 additional FTEs, how quickly you think you'll be able to staff up so that we can put this agency or this board in a better position to move a through these cases more quickly.

MR. BAKER: Certainly, Mr. Chair, members of the board. The community -- two parts of that question, both of which are extraordinarily important. I came to work here, and many of you watched, to a 66 percent vacancy rate. I won't say in perpetuity, because it probably was not in perpetuity. There have been times that this place has been staffed. They just haven't been very recently. We now have a 20 percent vacancy. The needle moves daily.

This Monday morning we brought on a new

to go in there and to meet with our students, particularly our basic training students who are beginning this career in law enforcement.

We train the cops and the dispatchers in New Mexico, and that's something that we take very seriously here and I know the members of this board take seriously. Our job, our aim, and our shared initiative here is to make them more professional, more capable, and to be able to return those things to the communities statewide in which they serve.

I'm proud to be standing at the front here of a very, very good team and report on the excellent work that they have done to this point. I look forward to continuing to work with this board under its leadership, the new attorney general and madam vice-chair, as we vector towards those goals during the time that we have. And thank you in advance for your support and your guidance of our important mission.

I will happily stand for any questions the board has.

CHAIRPERSON TORREZ: Thank you for the report, Mr. Baker. That was comprehensive and I think gave us a real overview of the progress that's been made over the last year.

academy instructor. So now we sit at a much more favorable and much more reflective of kind of state government in general. In fact, we're doing, I think, a little better than average today on our vacancy rate. I'll tell you what I attribute that to, because I think that is important. It's one of the things that we have focused our efforts on.

There seems to have been an absence of continuity of leadership over time which has led to an inability to address probably structural, longstanding problems. What I mean by that is improperly categorized the very people who are delivering the service that is paramount to this board and the law's existence, and that is law enforcement certification training.

If you don't properly classify the law enforcement or public safety professionals who are in demand in all of our communities in a way that we have never seen before, and you leave these folks a factor of at least a third behind as it relates to compensation, recognition, carryover of benefits, and standardized things for police officers, it's almost a recipe for that outcome.

And so we worked hard for this board, because that is really important related to our

classified state employees, and we've testified to correct those items. And I had incredible support from that board, unanimous consent to not only reclassify the positions to make them more appropriate, but also mirror that with compensation.

The leadership of our new secretary has made a significant impact, from my observation, related to leadership by example which helps steer the culture, which is the second part that we have worked on.

To add to your question, 19 is a lot. I asked for them, and I asked for them because I did not want to underask for -- I'd walked a thousand miles in the shoes when I made the ask. Not for a minute, not for a month. I've been serving in this capacity in hundreds of cases in front of this board. Over the period of time I've been here we've procured a significant backlog over time.

I think that I developed a feel for what is required to support the important functions, and I'm grateful for the legislative body's willingness to invest in support of the executive. The slow process is what it is for everybody else, and some parties included on this board.

We will grind through that with as much

commentary but to refrain from substantive discussions that haven't been noticed and placed on the appropriate agenda.

So with that, I will start with Cindy Pabst as the first member of the public.

MS. PABST: Good morning, Chair, members of the board, and the public. My name is Cindy Pabst. I work with a group of women in an organization called SOS -- Indivisible SOS. We are an advocacy -- an advocacy group that takes on certain issues that we believe are really important.

Last July Rachel Feldman, a member of this group, identified this issue trending among the police academy as one of the important issues that we'd like to take on, and we agreed, and we marshaled our forces and worked with Ben and his team for many months to create a bill that would address the issues we are now looking at. And we did get some success, but SB19 wasn't what we hoped for in its entirety, but it's a good first step.

So I do have some comments because the woman, Rachel, who was the spearhead of this effort -- you may remember her, some of you. She was the one carrying her oxygen around all the time. She's finally getting some help, and she's in Denver

efficiency as is humanly possible, keeping in mind that we have placed ourselves in a position where we can actually be more competitive.

So my expectations, if we can achieve that under suboptimal conditions and get ourselves staffed up to a more reasonable level here, that we will have symmetrical results now that the playing field is a little more balanced in our favor. So my hope is to be able to watch, July 1 when we have the FTEs available -- we're in the process of creating them as we speak -- my hope is to be specialized enough, supportive enough, and culturally receptive enough to be able to voice that.

CHAIRPERSON TORREZ: Thank you, Mr. Baker.

Are there any other questions from members of the board?

Thank you for your report, Director Baker.

At this time I would like to move on to public comment. I will note at the outset that in order to keep the meeting moving and to get to the disciplinary matters before the board later on, we've asked public comment to be limited to five minutes. And I also would remind board members that we can certainly ask speakers clarifying questions to try and better understand the nature of their

for ten days trying to discover what her health issues are. So she wrote out this list of things that she wanted me to tell all of you in this format.

So about the appropriations which didn't occur with this bill. We will go back to the legislature in 2024 to restore the money and the content that was cut. It wasn't cut because anyone opposed it. It happened to be an interesting method of sausage making in the legislative process. Interesting to watch but not fun to watch our bill get sort of cut into pieces, but we're hopeful for the next year.

2024 is a budget season. So if we can get a good handle on the needs and costs, we can take it through the committees this summer. We are looking to our growing coalition to generate ideas on this. We plan to aggressively identify and approve great people for the governor to appoint as training counsel and to the new certification board. We hope that you will think about appropriate candidates and let us know. You can get information to Ben or directly to Rachel on this matter. There will be a focus from now until early June so we can have some names that we can offer up.

The other issue she wanted me to address is we hope to work with Ben and his growing team to get started on identifying consultants to do the job task analysis, which will be expanded to the modernizing training from the basic through the ranks, and we expect to help to convene the PSTs to provide the groundwork for a needs assessment.

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The fifth thing that Rachel wanted me to discuss with you is that we are announcing a new initiative for our citizen law enforcement partnership. We're calling it women in law enforcement. You will hear more about this in the coming months. We will be interviewing women who are interested in sharing their stories from the frontline through the ranks and including PSTs. There will be a book, a media strategy, and outreach statewide to political folks and material to feed recruitment strategy. That's what's in line, recruitment strategy.

We are excited about getting this started, and we want to identify barriers and ideas about overcoming barriers for attracting women in law enforcement. Our goal is to attract more female talent and retain the people we have by identifying policies and other support that women feel they need amen.

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Mr. Chairman, board members, I totally appreciate the work that you do for law enforcement in our community. What I see here outstanding that the law enforcement academy and the staff, folding the flags and the white roses, you know, presenting the line of duty deaths of our brothers and our sisters that occurred last year. Not one of them that I can tell you was ever left alone. I was there with them.

As a law enforcement chaplain for the last 34 years, boots on ground, I've never left them alone. I appreciate the work that you do, continue doing the work. Stand fast, stand firm, and be in a ready state. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON TORREZ: And last, Chris Pecos?

MR. PECOS: Good morning, Mr. Chair and members of the board. You can hear me?

First, I've been coming here -- some of you know me pretty well. I've been coming here for nine years with very little luck, I must say.

What brought me here was the Santa Fe shooting of Jeannette Anaya in 2013 by a state police officer. I thought I've never seen a clearer

CHAIRPERSON TORREZ: Yes.

MR. VILLEGAS: Our Creator, Father God, this morning I ask you to be a protector for our brothers and ours sisters that sit on this board and all who dwell in the sacred place today to be a defender against all that is harmful or evil. Meet their needs before almighty God that they may be surrounded by God's holy angels and given the grace to conquer every danger and overcome all that would harm their health and well-being.

Father God, with your sacred holy breath, guide each one of them through life's journey so they may always walk safely together with you, your loving friendship and embrace, for the love of God,

case in my life that could have been prosecuted and was not. The state police cleared it. The DA helped the special grand jury to clear it. Nobody had been willing to prosecute it. That case is available to anyone who wants to look at it. That case is -- the Santa Fe Reporter called it Puff of Smoke. It even includes the transcript of the special grand jury.

Nobody, the attorney general, the DA, nobody was willing to prosecute that case, and I've never seen a clearer case in my life. We're still not willing to prosecute police officers. Jeannette Anaya is why I'm here.

So I've been coming for nine years now. This is including a lawsuit against the academy, which was finally resolved. It was an Open Meetings Act violation. The result of that was we finally put the curriculum back in the NMACs, where they had been -- legally had been removed. It took my lawsuit to be put them back in the NMACs where they shouldn't have been moved to in the first place.

The other -- the other big issue, and this is perhaps informative to the new board chair, the current curriculum going back to December of 2013, is illegal. It remains illegal. It was put in

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place in an illegal action in December of 2013.

That same -- that same basic curriculum, 677-hour curriculum still is the one that's in use. It should have been replaced years ago. The problem with the curriculum is that the -- well, for example, in Santa Fe, we have the worst -- I see Sheriff Mendoza there. We have the worst police training in the state right here in Santa Fe. Our curriculum is 677 hours. That's the base curriculum. It's reduced by 200 hours illegally in 2013. Illegally. We're running a 677-hour curriculum, and what they took out illegally, was they took out community policing and put in officer survival. All illegal.

I've raised the issue to this board and to this academy for years, and nobody wants to look at it. That illegal curriculum needs to be addressed. Here in Santa Fe we're running 677-hour basic curriculum. Las Cruces uses 1,089. If you just compare them, it's ridiculous. We should be running something that looks like Cruces.

The other thing I would say, the one thing I noticed, the chair, is when you adjusted the resolution, why didn't you get any input from the public. It's an old resolution. It concerns the

been doing a new curriculum every five years based on job task analysis. We haven't done that since 2002. These are crimes.

This is part of the reason I suggested that this board be replaced with a new regime is because you have not been doing your job. You just have not been doing your job, as I've been trying to tell you for nine years.

So it's like -- the other thing I would make a point of mentioning for the benefit of the nearest -- the New Mexico State Police, and I will -- this is my final comment in this myriad list of problems, is today, when I got involved with Jeanette Anaya, the New Mexico State Police use-of-force policy was illegal in that it did not comply with the Safe Pursuit Act, which is a law of the state.

That law today, the New Mexico State
Police safe pursuit policy, is still not compliant
with the Safe Pursuit Act. They won't even answer
queries on the matter, and it is still adopted
illegally because they're not putting it through the
public involvement act as they're required to do.
They should be putting it through -- I mean,
New Mexico Rules Act, it is required of them to do

public. It concerns us. You could have at least asked for input. To his credit, Attorney General King was more open to asking for input from the board than anybody else has been since.

Mr. Balderas was not good at that at all.

The other thing going on now is this -this again goes to the attorney general's office.
At one point Attorney General Balderas went out and
sought use-of-force policies from all the agencies
in the state. He got back about 100. That's to his
credit that he got that many. To his discredit, he
refused to put them online. Put them online so
people can see what the use-of-force policies are.
You've got 100 of them in your hands. Just put them
online, because -- I heard the director talking
about use-of-force policies. Part of the problem we
have with them is they're not uniform and nobody
knows what they are, so that needs to be public.

The other thing that I would have, IADLEST, which I understand we had spoken to originally. That is a crime -- IADLEST is a good national program. It was basically walked away from in 2002 or 2003 by Attorney Richardson and his staff. They're supposed to be doing -- by statute they're supposed -- by IADLEST rules, we should have

those policies. They've been violating that requirement. They just don't want to face the public with those policies.

So again, right now today I'd say somebody needs to get on that safe pursuit policy. It's violating the law.

I'll leave with you with this problem list, and hopefully it's looked at. Thanks again for your attention. It's been a long nine years. I'm growing old, as you can tell.

CHAIRPERSON TORREZ: Thank you.

We'll now at this point move to the next agenda item, number nine, the 2023 law enforcement memorial, and I would yield to -- to Deputy Secretary Baker to present that agency item.

MR. BAKER: Great question. Mr. Chair, Sheriff Mendoza, I'll start with the second part.

It's not voluntary. It's contemplated under the rules. It is something that is required.

It is something that we used this time around by

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1 using our Acadis portal. So you have to register, 2 you have to log in, you have to answer a series of 3 questions related to the suitability of your 4 academy, related to, you know, the number of inches 5 within the wall with which one needs to get over, 6 what one uses in order to accommodate for emergency 7 vehicle operations. Things that are measurables and

weights contemplated within the rules, that is something that is attested to by the satellite academy director upon submission and completion of the accreditation of those schools. That is something that can be physically inspected. In

these three instances, they were not. SHERIFF MENDOZA: Thank you.

I will tell the board, though, that there are a couple of downfalls. There's one that it doesn't necessarily issue an accreditation number. IADLEST issues an accreditation number, but the vendors that are putting on the training, they don't necessarily include that in their course completion certificate or on their rosters. Okay?

Second, we don't necessarily know of the expiration date. Okay? And so that's -- you know, they keep up with that, and the vendors, you know, who are doing this have to apply. Right? But again, you know, when we're taking this information in, I can't necessarily completely verify that that is the case. All right?

I will again yield the floor to Director -- Deputy Director Brian Coss to explain this.

MR. COSS: Mr. Chairman, members of the board, thank you very much. This is in particular consideration for this board to meet the in-service training requirements as listed in 29-7-7.1.

In that statute it requires that -specific for the in-service training requirements, that 40 hours every two years, that those programs be accredited, or the statute uses the word approve. The only way the board approves is through

So I just offer them for your consideration. I think it's worthwhile. There's a number of truly valuable training programs that they offer. It does create a little bit of a logistical backlog or conundrum for us to, you know, dig a little deeper before we move in. The case would be like if somebody attends a course that's accredited by you all, and it's a really simple process. We simply research that number. It has the expiration date right there, and we push a button, and in our new data management system it not only goes to the individual officer record, it goes to the agency record as well, as well the instructor record. It updates all of those at the same time.

And the hope is, I think, from IADLEST is that their programs would be able to do this as well. I will share with the board that they are recognized. This national certification program is recognized in 39 states. So it does have some validity. And again, this is just specific to the inservice training projects that we're discussing

And I'll be glad to stand for any questions if you all have any.

CHAIRPERSON TORREZ: Deputy Director Coss,

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I do have one question. You talked about this being limited to inservice training. Can you speak a little bit more to something that Director Baker had commented on earlier with the adoption of this new technology, which I think is an exciting development for the law enforcement academy, and that has to do with peer intervention. Specifically what -- if you can, give us a sense of what kind of peer intervention training happens on the inservice side, because I would imagine that there's been a real change in the landscape on what peer intervention means from people who may have been certified, you know, 15, 20 years ago to the present day.

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MR. COSS: Mr. Chairman, I appreciate the question. So there's a couple of areas that -remember that the vast majority of the inservice training hours were mandated by statute, there are a couple of topics that are mandated by this board, and then the remaining are optional training hours that one could receive for their specialty, you know, if they're working an internet unit or, you know, whatever their specialty might be.

The peer intervention has historically taken place in a couple different ways. It's taught in the use of force, the when things are going to be

So to answer your question specifically, it does take place in a couple of different places within the curriculum historically, and it's going to have a greater emphasis very soon, within months.

5 CHAIRPERSON TORREZ: Thank you. 6

DR. GREEN: Mr. Deputy Director, that leads me to a broader question with regard to changes in the legislation. Is there a direct path for those changes that affect the curriculum to encourage updates to the curriculum? Does that happen automatically, or is that something that needs to be included in our processes?

MR. COSS: Yes, ma'am. So, Mr. Chairman, Ms. Vice-Chair, I definitely appreciate the question, because that is oftentimes where it can get pretty difficult, right? We always try to do the best we can in providing updated curriculum.

You know, I myself have been here -- some would say probably longer than I need to be, but I have put my heart and soul into this place. For 15 years I've asked for a JTA to get curriculum still to this day. We're not quite there yet. We're very close. We're super close. Right?

The last legislative session provided some funding. This legislative session provided some.

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done. Not necessarily the how, but when we're going to do the things we're going to do. And then it's also taught in the interaction with persons with mental impairment, which literally by statute again has a requirement for de-escalation in practical scenarios. So it is included in those currently.

It will be enhanced. As we speak, myself and the deputy secretary just entered into an agreement and are working on a purchase order to have the curriculum updated that will meet House Bill 68, essentially. And so that's going to update instructor level training, that's going to update end-user training, that's going to update FTO forms. Not necessarily which, you know, FTO program you necessarily agree with or use within your department, but to be able to help them add to their evaluations of the officers as they're moving through this. So that is -- that is already in the works.

Georgetown University in particular has a great peer-to-peer intervention program, and so, you know, we're looking to -- you know, some well-established, and they've been -- you know, they've been very generous in helping us provide that answer. That is ongoing.

So I think by the time we put these two together, we're going to be really close.

As part of that JTA was the curriculum development behind it. We're the first state in the union that's going to be doing this, because we're taking it from basic training all the way through FTO to ensure that folks can make the transitions, right, from start to finish. So we're definitely working on that.

And so until we have that in place, right, we use a number of best practices. There's bureau of justice surveys that come out every couple of years that we kind of rely on as well to help with the training topics and some of the best practices as well.

As we mentioned, IADLEST is kind of what the topic is here. They have some best practices as well as their recommendations. Not necessarily standards but their recommendations that we can update that curriculum on as well.

But the important part for us is having to be able to evaluate that curriculum. Right? Anybody can update curriculum. That's easy enough. Right? They think they can just change words on the PowerPoint, and the curriculum is updated. That is

not at all updating curriculum.

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As you guys well know, it's the historical document, right, that needs to be updated, and that has to be evaluated before it's updated. So there has to be something to go back and truly ground that to before we make that change.

But, yes, ma'am, we're continuing to work on that as well, and we're super hopeful that the issue will be put through.

DR. GREEN: Thank you.

Mr. Chair and Deputy Director Coss, so IADLEST -- I may be mispronouncing it -- that's something that agencies can use for inservice training; is that correct?

MR. COSS: It is, sir. Mr. Chair and board members, it absolutely is. So this is another training provider, if you will. Well, and the truth be known, what they are is they're more of a certifying authority that certifies others. Let's say Axon, as an example. Axon is accredited through IADLEST, through this national certification, and so it's recognized in 39 states.

I've been in communication with them for months, you know, trying to figure out, you know, what might be an avenue to make this viable for everybody.

But what it absolutely does is it opens up your agencies, 193 agencies statewide, to a number of more resources that they may not have had previously. Many training budgets are tight, so the agencies spend their money on inservice training first and foremost, and then they begin to start looking at other training as they have the ability, and I think this will increase that.

And just, you know, for full disclosure, it's just going to take a little bit more work on our part to make sure it's a seamless change like you're talking about. Whether you're plugging in a number or have an expiration date, whatever it may be, that will be as seamless as we can make it. I'm confident that we can work that out.

SHERIFF MENDOZA: Thank you.
